

MEDIA RELEASE: Ahead of 2023 Federal Budget, ICC Intentional Community Consortium Advocate for Deeply Affordable and Supportive Housing for Canadians with Developmental Disabilities

For immediate release- Monday, March 27

OTTAWA, ON - The Intentional Community Consortium, in collaboration with Reena, Community Living Toronto, OASIS, and Provincial Network on Developmental Services, kicked off their Advocacy Day ['Day on the Hill'] this morning ahead of the 2023 Budget Presentation – with an opening press conference held on Parliament Hill in Ottawa.

Consortium leaders and members addressed the importance of the National Housing Strategy and reiterated the significance of plans to increase deeply affordable and supportive housing for those with Developmental Disabilities across Canada.

The ICC group, including supported individuals and agency CEO's, will spend the morning in direct advocacy with a multipartisan group of MP's.

"We are excited to have the opportunity to speak on the pressing issues faced by individuals with developmental disabilities and their families. We hope to create meaningful changes in policies and funding to make supportive housing accessible to those who need it the most," said Bryan Keshen, CEO of Reena and founder of the ICC.

"At Community Living Toronto, we are committed to enhancing the quality of life for people with intellectual disabilities," added Brad Saunders, CEO, Community Living Toronto. "Our vision for housing is one which strikes a balance between inclusion and impact, creating spaces where people with intellectual disabilities can be integrated into communities and a true sense of belonging can be achieved."

The National Housing Strategy presents an opportunity to make a significant difference in the lives of people with developmental disabilities.

By increasing deeply affordable housing, the ICC seeks to provide solutions leading to better opportunities for this marginalized population.
